Tribble is a Certified Fund-Raising Executive (CFRE) whose previous fundraising experience includes positions with Arts & Science Council, Hospice at Charlotte, and most recently as director of development for the Men's Shelter of Charlotte.

"In addition to Amy's long-standing commitment to the Council's mission and her unique level of experience with our work for children, Amy reputation as a fine person and as a successful non-profit development officer make her the perfect person to lead the expansion of support for the Council's vision of improving the lives of all children in our community."
